

Google Search Strategies

- Google is a frequently used tool for searching for ancestors, but has several limitations
 - Your results are only as good as the information provided
 - Google does not cluster information into useful chunks
 - Google limits your search results to North America
- Boolean operators can help you succeed
 - AND, OR, NOT
 - Google does not use the Boolean NOT as a limiter, you must use – for results.
 - Quotation Marks "" can narrow your results to a specific person or phrase.



Googling Your Family Tree:


- Google does not sort results or search for alternate terms (e.g. headstone, grave marker, monument).
- Alternative search sites: www.yippy.com or www.bing.com
 - Clusters information into "clouds"
 - Includes a list of sources/sites to help save time
 - Offers access to maps, images and blogs just like Google

- Google has partnered with universities and archives to digitize and provide access to millions of hard to find/out of print titles
- Book text fully searchable
- Log in with a user name and password to save items to your bookshelf for future reference

- You can build your own interactive maps, plot your family history, and share it with others! www.google.com/maps/about/mymaps
- MapsGL interactive 3D imagery for buildings & landmarks
- Measure distances between points
- Google Street-View gives you an opportunity to 'visit' family sites around the globe!
- View street view maps back to 2008.



Google News: http://news.google.com/newspapers

- Global news in multiple languages
- Alphabetical by newspaper title
- Browsable only, no search capability
- Unprintable- need to do screen captures to save images



Google Photos: www.google.com/photos/about

- Upload crop and edit an unlimited number of photos* (exceptions apply to images over 16 megapixels- those count against your drive storage).
- Create albums and provide information (metadata) on each image (e.g. date, location, description).
- Tag the faces of friends and family
- Utilize face recognition software to hasten your uploads and identify unnamed family
- Google Photos categorizes your images by people, places and things

- Click on upload an image, find your photo within your device then click on search by image.
- Google will search the web for a match and provide the link to any images it finds.
